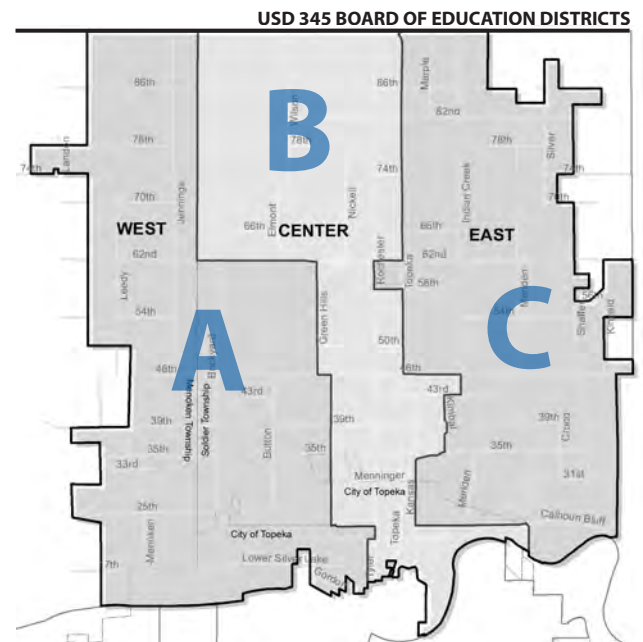
desire for our students to be ready with the skills and knowledge needed for post-secondary success and we're seeing the results of those endeavors month after month.

MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

Project Lead the Way (PLTW) Classes Added to Elementary

PLTW creates transformative learning experiences for students through engaging, hands-on learning experiences. Through the Project Lead the Way curriculum, students are challenged to develop critical thinking and problem solving skills. Each elementary building has a PLTW teacher and classroom for weekly lessons. PLTW is now offered in all buildings K-12.

Mathes Early Learning Center Opens

The district opened its first building that is dedicated to early learning. Mathes Early Learning Center houses all birth to preschool program in the Seaman School District.



James Adams - Leadership for Tomorrow Class of 2017 Graduate

James Adams was one of twenty-five education leaders from across Kansas to complete a year-long leadership development class sponsored by the Kansas Association of School Boards. KASB's Leadership for Tomorrow Class of 2017 was chosen last January through a nomination and application process focusing on individual leadership in public education and participation in activities that promote effective governance and raise student achievement. They were recognized during the KASB Annual Conference in Wichita Dec. 2, 2017.

Lindy Broeckelman - Horizon Award Winner

Lindy Broeckelman, first-grade teacher at Logan Elementary, was one of 32 first-year educators from Kansas who are

being recognized for their outstanding teaching skills through the 2018 Kansas Horizon Award program.

This publication is produced by the district annually and used to help guide parents through the entire school year. The district also received a certificate of merit in the special purpose category for its informational preschool flier. 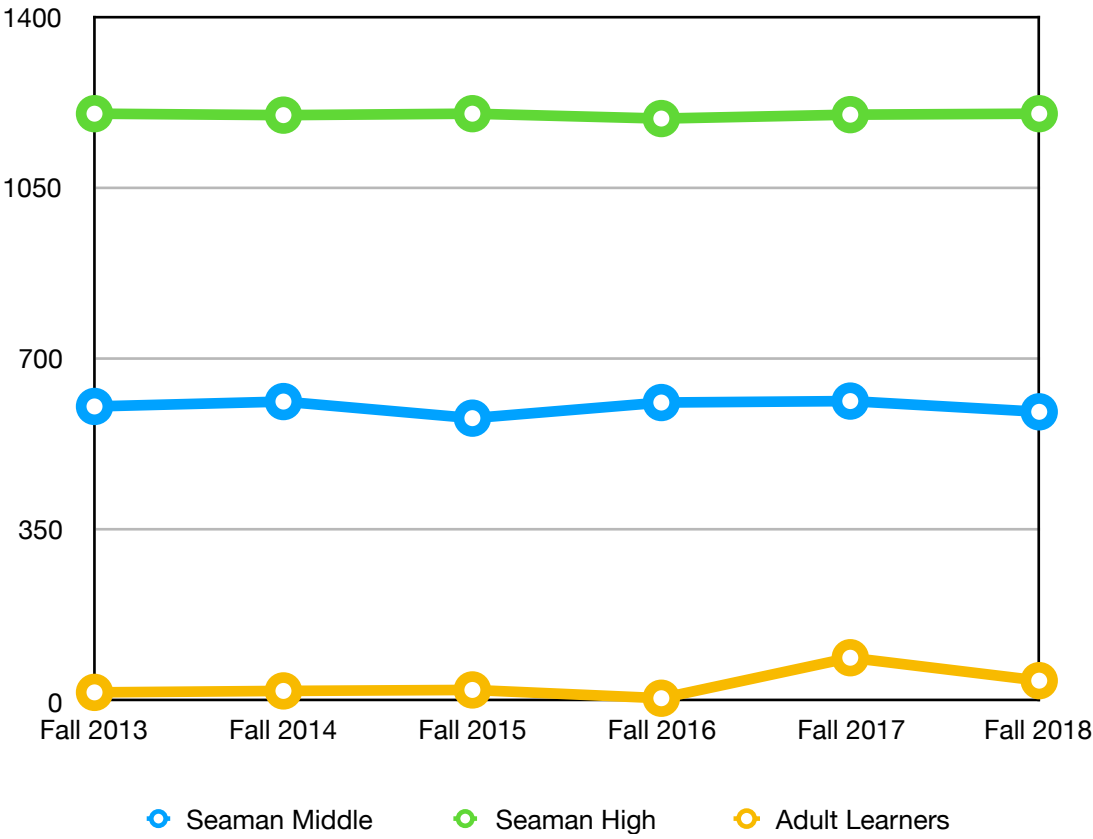
TOTAL ENROLLMENT



PreK/ELEMENTARY ENROLLMENT



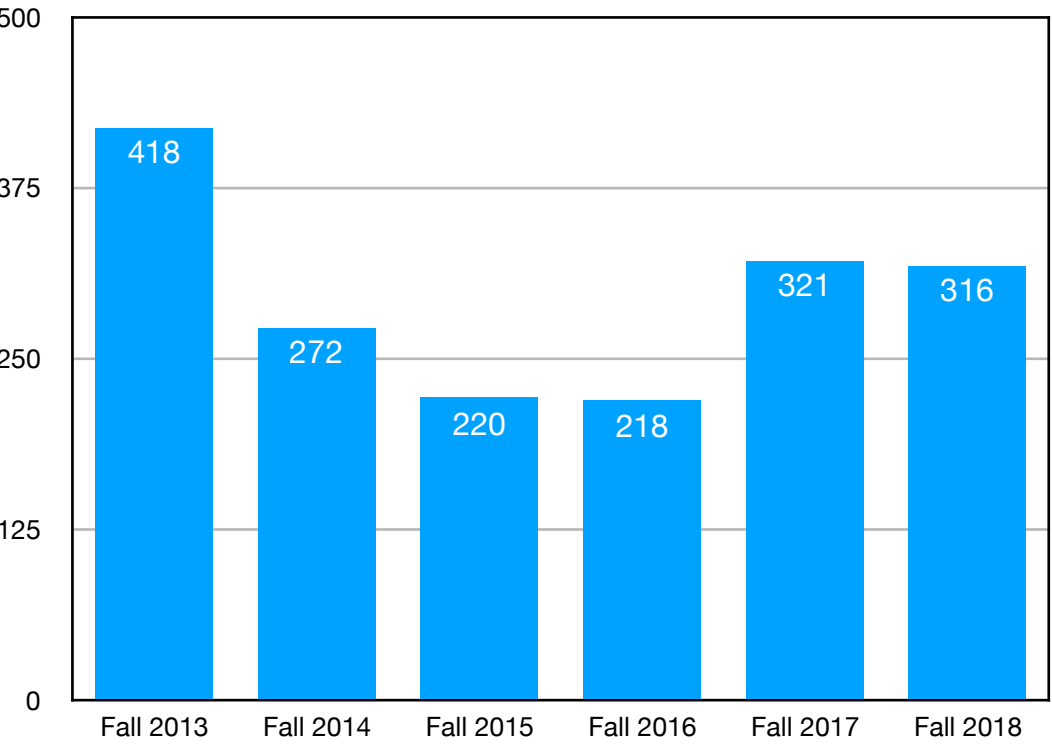
