On May 17, 2020, we will graduate nearly 300



At Seaman, we pride ourselves on being a family of community members who care about all of our kids and each other. This year, our family turns 100 years old as we celebrate our 100th graduating class from Seaman High School. Whether you are a lifelong family member who is a Seaman alum or new to our Seaman family, we care about you, your children, and your grandchildren. We believe in the importance of working together to tackle new opportunities and challenges we face as a school district. This issue of the Communicator contains several stories of these opportunities and challenges.

We are so excited to offer breakfast at all of our schools for the first time ever. Having a nutritious breakfast in the morning is important to our children's success that day. We also realize how hectic it can be for our working families to get their children off to school with a nutritious breakfast in their tummies. With the option of breakfasts at all of our schools this year, families can rest easy knowing we are here to help ensure your child gets something healthy to eat before school starts.

Some of the bigger challenges facing our kids in our 100th year are e-cigarettes (vaping), bullying, depression, and suicide. At Seaman, we are tackling the e-cigarette issue head on by forming a new "vaping prevention committee." This committee will meet throughout the year to become better educated about the research around harmful effects of vaping, how manufacturers are marketing to our kids, and how to spot a vaping device. The committee plans to host a community conversation around the dangers of vaping later this fall.

Addressing bullying behavior, both online and in our schools and community, continues to be another point of focus for our schools. This year, our technology

department will provide at-home device filtering to help our families keep their children safe online while using district issued laptops. Our schools also offer social emotional programming throughout PreK-12 and we have formed an anti-bullying committee led by our directors of teaching and learning. Bullying at school and in our community requires all of us to stand up to bullying behavior. If you see something, say something. These challenges require our Seaman family - both at school and at home - to come together, become better educated, and communicate effectively to help keep our kids safe.

Speaking of communication, we know how important it is to provide effective communication to our families. This year, we are offering a variety of ways for our Seaman family to stay informed. We provide an online "Board Digest" which contains information about the most recent school board meeting. We also provide an online monthly "eCommunicator" containing news and information about our district. A paper version of the "Communicator" is mailed out to all Seaman households quarterly. For those of you who are effective users of our website, Facebook and/or Twitter, all of these communication sources are available via these means as well. In our 100th year of educating students, we are proud of our Seaman family's heritage. We are also proud to embrace new family members who bring diversity to our Seaman family. While we are facing new challenges in our 100th year, we are also facing incredible opportunities to improve the future for our children.

Connecting with you

The Seaman School District is committed to delivering relevant, timely, accurate, and consistent communication with all stakeholders. The USD 345 Communication Department regularly produces a variety of publications, designed to inform and guide, based on community needs and feedback. District social media is used throughout the district to supplement its main communication channels while actively engaging with the public.

"Our public has access to more information than ever before," said Candace LeDuc, Director of Communications. "With so many places to go for information, the challenge is creating a well-organized format so our community can find timely, relevant, and accurate content without having to dig for it. We've made several changes and enhancements over the past few years and we're always evaluating and looking for new ways to connect with our community. Some of our newest additions just launched this year, including a new monthly e-newsletter and redesigned websites."

New e-Newsletter created after Parent Feedback

Parent and community involvement is an important aspect of Seaman School District. Students, staff, parents, and community members continually work together to ensure the success of all students. At the end of last school year, the district's technology committee asked for input on parent communication. The results showed SchoolMessenger as the top source for parent information with 72% accessing online content through their mobile devices. Parents also wanted more info on calendar items. After reviewing survey results, the communication department created the new e-Communicator. This new publication will be the official

e-newsletter for the district in a mobile-friendly design, and emailed through SchoolMessenger. The e-Communicator will be emailed at the beginning of each month and will include more calendar events and important district info. The public can always view current and past e-Communicators by visiting www.seamanschools.org/eCommunicator. The printed Communicator will continue to be printed and mailed to Seaman addresses on a quarterly basis.

New Website Launched

After more than a year of planning, designing, and migrating previous content, the District launched redesigned websites for all schools. The new websites all follow a similar navigation so content search is consistent when families



move from school website to school website. Each site holds a main menu item called "Resource Center" for important and frequently searched material. The main menu follows users throughout their navigation to help gain quick access to the information they're seeking, from any page.



The new design incorporates a "responsive" layout that adapts to different mobile devices. The site was also designed to fulfill web accessibility requirements under the American Disabilities Act, making it accessible to individuals who have vision, hearing, and physical disabilities.

"We'll continue to update and improve user experience," said LeDuc, "so please, jump online and visit us often. "Users can also email me with suggestions. I'm always excited to hear how we can improve. I hope our families enjoy the new website and find it inviting, engaging, and easy to navigate."

of 1:1 MacBook deployment for grades 7-12, and a districtwide initiative of incorporating blended learning (student learning via electronic and online media as well as traditional teaching) in all of our buildings. The district is committed to providing the safest possible experience for students who are learning to navigate the

boundless mountain of information available on the internet in a 21st century learning environment.

Under the Children's Internet **Protection Act** (CIPA), school districts are responsible for implementing

technology measures or internet filters to restrict access to sites that are "harmful to minors." CIPA requires three elements for compliance: 1.) content filtering to prevent access to obscene, pornographic, or harmful images; 2.) monitoring of online activities of minors; and 3.) education in appropriate online behavior and cyberbullying awareness.

The district currently filters all devices using the school's internet and will soon add content filtering to all school-issued devices, even when they're used off-campus. This means when a student is at home using their school MacBook, they will have the same filtering used at school. The content filter checks sites against a massive cloud hosted dynamic database of URLs, IP addresses and websites, while also enforcing safe search on all search engines. Real-time web activity monitors generate usage data that helps us customize our filtering strategies and enforce new rules where necessary.

"New sites pop up daily and we're continuously updating our content filtering to find the right balance between safety and access to the rich educational materials that will support all academic and curriculum endeavors," said Jeff Mathes,

In addition to content filtering, the district covers online safety with students using digital citizenship curriculum. "We want our students to understand what safe internet access and behavior looks like," said Megan Nussbaum, Director of Innovation."Something that

> parents and educators should know is that we can't block every piece of unwanted material," Nussbaum says. "Technology only takes us so far. This is why education on internet safety is so important right now. Many of our students access the unfiltered web on their own smart phone. We have to educate our students as they

learn safe internet practices in an increasingly mobile device-focused world."

The district uses Common Sense Education's award winning digital citizenship curriculum to instruct our K-12 students on the digital citizenship knowledge they need to make smart choices online and in life. Designed and developed in partnership with Project Zero at the Harvard Graduate School of Education, and guided by research with thousands of educators, each digital citizenship lesson takes on real challenges and digital dilemmas that students face today, giving

detectors in bathrooms. "We have a professional duty to make sure this is something we address," said Fernandez-Flores. A representative from PARS talked to the committee about how nicotine can be considered a gateway drug to other chemicals when kids are trying to manage themselves when it comes to anxiety and stress. The elementary

level is looking into curriculum resources around vaping.

The committee will host a community conversation on November 12 from 6:00 to 8:00 pm at Seaman High School. All parents and students are invited to attend this important discussion centered around the potential dangers of vaping, misconceptions about e-cigarettes, and how we can all help our kids and community prevent vaping.

Recently, the district has partnered with local agencies, teachers, staff, parents, and students to form a vaping prevention committee. Local agencies include Shawnee Regional Prevention and Recovery Services (PARS), Kansas State Department of Education (KSDE), Shawnee County, Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Kansas (BCBSKS), and medical personnel.

"We formed this committee as a way to be less reactive to this growing issue and more proactive," said Danira Fernandez-Flores, Director of Secondary Education. "As a school district, we have the will but we're lacking the resources, which is why we're calling on other agencies for help. We are all here for the health of our youth."

USD 345 district policy was recently updated to include e-cigarettes on the district's prohibited list SEAMAN HIGH and the committee spent time reviewing these **SCHOOL** policies. Seaman High School students from the committee suggested a higher consequence for distributors since many students are underage and relying on older students for materials. The committee also discussed updating tobacco-free signage to include "no vaping," and more tobacco education for students at the elementary level. "Unfortunately, elementary schools have seen vape pens brought in by students," said Rebecca Kramer, Director of Elementary Education. "Students are curious, they see all of these enticing flavors and want to try them out. We need to be able to help our staff and parents talk about potential dangers with their kids and

what to look for."

According to the US Centers for Disease Control (CDC)
website, "CDC, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration,
state and local health departments, and other clinical
and public health partners are investigating a
multi-state outbreak of lung disease associated with
e-cigarette product (devices, liquids, refill pods,
and/or cartridges) use."

CDC recommends that you consider refraining from using e-cigarette or vaping products. If you have recently used an e-cigarette or vaping product and you have symptoms like those reported in this outbreak see a healthcare provider.

KEY FACTS

Using an e-cigarette product is commonly called vaping.

E-cigarettes work by heating a liquid to produce an aerosol that users inhale into their lungs.


The liquid can contain: nicotine, tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) and cannabinoid (CBD) oils, and other substances and additives.

USD 345 Kansas Communities That Care Survey Results


Cigarettes

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
